## FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR MIKE

#### **Inside Out**

As you might remember, last fall we had a book discussion on *Inside Out* by Kay L. Kotan and Michael J. Scott. At the end of the book discussion, I asked if some of the participants would write short summaries of the chapters so that we could share them in the newsletter. The book itself is about shifts or pivots that church should consider making given that much of the American culture has changed around its preference for church attendance.

The shifts the authors recommend are: Moving away from churches being Sunday-Centric (church is a Sunday thing); away from being Building-Centric (church happens in a building); away from Pastor-Centric (ministry is a pastor thing), away from Offering-Plate Dependency (churches can rely only on the offering plate to fund ministries). In addition, the authors discuss two things to pivot towards: Becoming emotionally and culturally competent (knowing the stories and concerns of our nearby neighbors) and moving towards Christian social entrepreneurship (entering into partnerships to accomplish ministry goals).

We will include one article a month in the newsletter over the next six months. I hope the articles will help stimulate some new ideas for us all on how we can do church together. Please look for Laurie Campbell's summary of chapter 2 (continued on pg. 4)

**Primavera Men's Shelter** – A new year means the Primavera Men's Shelter is anxiously awaiting our next dinner on Saturday, January 27<sup>th</sup>. We cook and serve a great five course meal to men living with homelessness and they so appreciate our efforts.

Committee Members Needed – This year, a number of our participants have completed their 3 year assignments on the Church & Society – Missions
Committee, so now we are in need of some new members. Our current outreach efforts are well defined for 2024, and our missions budget has been approved. This committee operates more like an ongoing "task force," so potential committee members might anticipate no more than quarterly update meetings. Are you interested in knowing more? We need volunteers for the 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday of each month, from approximately 2:00 pm to 6:00 pm. The menu is planned, and the grocery shopping is done by team leaders. The work involves standing and lifting, cooking, and serving. All volunteers who are vaccinated, gloved, and over the age of 12 are welcome.

Casa Maria Soup Kitchen – Approximately six to seven times throughout the year, Catalina's missions team cooks and serves our special chicken and vegetable soup recipe for our neighbors living with homelessness and hunger. Although we do not have a 2024 schedule at this time, we expect to do a Casa Maria outreach sometime soon. This is an early morning mission outreach where our team of 3 volunteers cook

and serve more than 200 bowls of soup for our neighbors. We start very early, (approximately 6:30 am to 10:30 am). This work involves standing, lifting, cooking, and serving, using large commercial pots in a very small kitchen. All volunteers who are vaccinated, gloved, and over the age of 12 are welcome. As soon as we have the 2024 schedule, you will be welcome to volunteer. # INSIDE OUT: CHAPTER 2 BY LAURIE CAMPBELL

Chapter 2 of the book *Inside Out* is titled "Moving Away from Building-Centric". What does that mean? The chapter highlights the tendencies of churches to do most everything within its walls—including worship, Bible studies, education and Sunday School classes, committee

meetings, and even collecting items for food and clothing drives. The underlying assumption being that people should be and will be drawn to the church (that is, the church building) instead of the church (that is, the people of the church) going out into the community. The suggestion in the chapter is to move out from beyond our walls to meet people "where they are doing life".

The chapter points to how and where Jesus conducted his ministry. Instead of hanging around the temple waiting for people to come to him, Jesus ministered to people in their homes, at a well, at a pool, on hillsides, and in the streets. Methodism's own John Wesley preached outside and rode thousands of miles on horseback to share his message with people, where they were living and working.

Moving outside of a church's walls includes moving virtually and physically outside those walls. Virtually, churches need to develop a robust online ministry. The


chapter quotes several statistics that indicate that many people prefer online services to inperson services. But livestreaming services is not enough. A full (continued on page 10)




#### Lent

The season of Lent begins on February 14<sup>th</sup> this year with Ash Wednesday. We will have a simple offering of the imposition of ashes on that Wednesday between noon and 1 p.m. The time is offered as a drop in situation. You may come any time it is convenient for you during that hour.

For Lenten worship, I decided to go back and look at a book I read a while ago. The book is *The Celtic Way of Evangelism* by George G. Hunter III. I thought of this book because it has some affinity with the work we have been doing with Paul Nixon and some of the recommendations he gave to us in his report. One of these is the work the Hub Committee is doing on working on reconnecting with our neighbors (those who live nearby, work nearby, play nearby, etc.).

Hunter's book, in general is about the way evangelism, or sharing the Good News, was done in Ireland as opposed to many other areas. One of the differences was that it focused on relationship building as primary. This connects to the chapter I mentioned above from *Inside Out* about becoming emotionally and culturally competent.



I hope the sermon series will not only help us learn a little about Christian history but give us some inspiration about how to connect to those around us.

## HAPPY 2024 FROM DAY SCHOOL

We kicked off our school year in August in the middle of renovations of our school; we received a grant from LISC for \$125K towards infrastructure. We were able to upgrade the flooring in the entire school from tile to floating wood paneled floors, each classroom and office space was able to select their choice of paint for their walls. Classrooms with sinks in their classroom received new stainless-steel sinks with high faucet and attached hose. Even our kitchen got an updated paint job on its walls. Renovations were completed at the end of September, and we had an Open House in late October to showcase all our new renovations.



We lost two long time teachers last year suddenly; both will dearly be missed. Ms. Maria, our twos teacher that we lost to pancreatic cancer; now has a memorial bench placed in front of the Day School in her honor. We are working on a memorial for Ms. Carolina (2's teacher and floater); both teachers dedicated their love and time to caring for our children.

In October, we celebrated National Pumpkin Day on October 26<sup>th</sup> where we created a mural from rolling pumpkins in paint across a paint canvas and our mural was displayed in Office. We also had our Halloween Parade in the Trike Yard; all our parents came out to see our students and some parents passed out candy. Our 3's and Pre-K walked over to Trick-or-Treat at the Library and each child received a new book from the Library.



In November, we had our 1<sup>st</sup> Annual Friendsgiving on November 15<sup>th</sup> in our Trike Yard – parents brought in main dishes like ham, turkey and chicken, side dishes, desserts, and drinks. Parents sat together and shared a meal together and conversations. (continued on pg. 7)

# FEBRUARY OBSERVANCES FROM THE MULTI-CULTURAL COMMITTEE

Cord Jefferson, who grew up in Tucson and is a Canyon Del Oro High School grad, wrote and directed the Oscar-nominated movie, *American Fiction* (as reported in the <u>Daily Star</u>). Its five Oscar nods include "Best Adapted Screenplay." Jefferson, who is 41, worked as a journalist and editor after college, then began writing for TV in 2015, earning a Primetime Emmy in 2019. (Incidentally, the film includes a number of references to Tucson, including local bands of his youth.)



Mr. Jefferson's achievements exemplify the theme of this year's Black History Month, "African Americans and the Arts." They are but one illustration of the impact that Black individuals have on our history and culture. This month should bring our focus to other such individuals and what their accomplishments should mean to

us. More broadly, the month aims to serve as a platform for learning about, reflecting on and celebrating the heritage, accomplishments and experiences of Black Americans. We hope you will take the time to explore those things.

The United Nations established February 20<sup>th</sup> in 2007 as <u>World Day of Social Justice</u>, recognizing the need to promote social justice, which includes efforts to tackle issues such as poverty, exclusion, gender inequality, unemployment, human rights, and social protections. online ministry needs to include "worship, hospitality, connection, discipleship for all ages, service, prayer, generosity, and leadership".

The chapter points out that Gen Zs (people born between 1997 and 2012) are now the

largest population and they, combined with Millennials, make up more than half the population. Both generations socialize on and get their information from online platforms.

To physically move outside of a church's walls, churches need to get out into their communities to build relationships and understand the needs of the community. The chapter ends with a story about a church that teamed up with a



school district to deliver meals to food-insecure families. The initiative grew into a much larger program that serves a large homeless population. The program hosts "block parties" where they cook and distribute food and provide an opportunity for people to "shop" for socks, underwear, coats, and gloves. When asked one day what he was doing, the pastor leading the program replied, "We are eating and shopping with our friends today."

Catalina has a beautiful facility and grounds. We livestream our services and do some wonderful mission projects outside of our walls, but much of what we do still happens within



those walls. It's time to step out and take our message to our neighbors "where they are already doing life". Catalina's Hub Team, formed as a result of our work with Paul Nixon, is reaching out to our neighbors to begin developing relationships with them. We want to grow into being a church that has our community at its heart. In the coming months, the Hub Team will share information on how you can be involved in building community with our neighbors.
