FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR MIKE

Lent is fully underway and we are quickly approaching Holy Week and Easter. I want to let you know about some of the opportunities for worship and formation during Lent and into Holy Week. I am leading a book discussion on Father Richard Rohr's

book *Everything Belongs*. Rohr's book is an invitation to the contemplative prayer life. In this book, he does not get into the how to of contemplative prayer. Instead, he focuses on the gifts contemplative prayer bring into our lives—offering us a different way to connect to God.



For a little context, contemplative prayer in

Christian tradition is similar to what Eastern religions call
meditation. Contemplation is a silent waiting on God. In
contemplative prayer we do not come to God with our own agenda
but with the intention of opening ourselves to the presence and
action of God in our lives. It is, then, a prayer of silence, waiting
and trusting that the Spirit knows us and can work in our lives as
we set aside our agendas for a time.

Casa Maria Soup Kitchen -

Approximately six to seven times throughout the year, Catalina's missions team cooks and serves our special chicken and vegetable soup recipe for our neighbors living with homelessness and hunger. We served

our excellent chicken vegetable soup to approximately 200 hungry people on February 10th, a rainy Saturday morning. Thanks so much, Rich and Kathy Mayorga, for helping with this event. Our next date to cook and serve is Saturday, April 6th. This is an early morning mission outreach where a team of 3 or 4 volunteers cook and serve more (continued on page 3)

UMC GENERAL CONFERENCE IN CHARLOTTE, NC

The Commission on the General Conference announced that the 2024 United Methodist General Conference will be held April 23 – May 3, 2024, at <u>Charlotte Convention Center</u> in Charlotte, North Carolina.



"The Commission selected Charlotte as the site that best met our varied needs. We believe that delegates and attendees will be pleased with all the city has to offer," said Kim Simpson, Chair of the Commission on the General Conference. "In making the selection, Simpson said that the Commission looked at the suitability and capacity of meeting facilities, availability of adequate space, the proximity of hotel rooms, accessibility and convenience of travel and costs of meeting space, lodging, meals and airfare. Proposals from three cities were considered, but ultimately Charlotte was determined to be the best fit.

The last General Conference was set to happen in Minneapolis, Minnesota, until the pandemic made it necessary to postpone the quadrennial legislative event until 2024.

theme of 2015 was "Women and Slavery". The International Day also "aims at raising awareness about the dangers of racism and prejudice today".



Moving Away from Sunday Centric Worship

Chapter 1 Summary, Inside Out: Everting Ministry Models for the Postmodern Culture

As I typed those words, I am not even sure what they all mean even after 6 weeks of book study with Pastor Mike, so I'll try to put this into plain English.

Church attendance across denominations is falling to the point of crisis. More and more people identify themselves as Nones when asked for their religious preferences. Kay Kotan



and Michael Scott, Methodist ministers involved in church planting, wrote this guide to creating worship and ministries for the 21st century. They encourage churches to turn themselves inside out (evert), to reach out to the unchurched instead of focusing on the inside congregation.

One of the reasons for lower church attendance is that individuals and families have more options on Sundays. When I was growing up in Maryland, attending the local southern Baptist church, we went to Sunday school and church in the morning, had lunch at the Big Boy, then came back to church in the evening for a youth program and another worship service. There were other youth programs, prayer services, and choir practice during the week. Maryland had blue laws which meant most

businesses were closed on Sunday. Sunday was a day of rest and worship. Essential businesses that remained open covered their beer and liquor shelves on Sunday.

Today Sunday is a day for many other activities. People crowd grocery and big box stores. They hang out at coffee shops reading the New York Times or other sites online. Sports on television is nearly 24/7. People play golf and pickleball. Families are engaged in their children's sports leagues, soccer, baseball, basketball, football, swimming, volleyball, and more. What the churches offer for children no longer seems relevant or important today.

The worship community described in Acts 2 "were unified as they worshiped at the temple day after day. In homes, they broke bread and shared meals with glad and generous hearts." How different from the way our Sundays look now.

If the Sunday morning worship is not reaching new people, Kotan and Scott want us to rethink Sunday. They look at Jesus, who spent time at the temple, but also spent most of his time hanging out with people in their everyday lives. The hospitality (continued on page 9)

churches provide on Sunday needs to broaden to other days and times in the week. That would really be welcoming to the unchurched.

Sunday morning worship which is not reaching new people comes at a cost. Consider the money spent on church buildings and grounds, staff, ministry leaders, and the energy of congregations centered on Sunday morning services.

Kotan and Scott recommend churches become relationally centered by doing the following outside of Sunday morning: pray with one another, study the Bible together, share meals, serve together, and worship together.

People in the Bible built altars and worshiped God as the spirit moved them, like Noah after the flood, and the Hebrews after the exodus from Egypt. Jesus taught



that God is in all of us. The authors state that God can be met in our homes, at work, in a bar, anywhere at all. Scott and his wife went to a restaurant during one of their church plantings and found a worship experience with the people they met there. Church can happen in our daily life experiences if we are open to being less Sunday centered.
