## **Upcoming Church Conferences**

I just want to take the time to update the church on some upcoming church conferences happening in October and then in November. The first is on Sunday, October 12<sup>th</sup> at 11:30 a.m. (following our worship service). We spent some time in September having presentations on a Simplified Accountable Structure (SAS) for our church governance. I want to thank those who came to the presentations. We wanted those who were interested to be able to find out what the SAS can do for our church.

We did those presentations in anticipation of the October 12<sup>th</sup> meeting. It is at this meeting that we will take a vote on whether or not to adopt a Simplified Accountable Structure. Scott Campbell has provided a summary of what SAS is elsewhere in the newsletter. Please take a look if you were not able to make one of the presentations. Additionally, I have a recording of one of the sessions I can make available. Let me know if you are interested. Also, as a reminder, a church conference is where all church members can vote. The meeting itself is open to all and so all are invited to attend.

At those September presentations, we passed out interest forms for people who might be interested in joining the leadership board—if approved on October 12<sup>th</sup>. If you would like to be considered for a position on the board, please turn in a form to me or email me and I can send a form to you. The leadership board members will be selected differently than how we do nominations normally. We will hold interviews based on the interest forms and the nominations team will make the final selection after the interviews. This is all a part of the changes that are associated with the Simplified Accountable Structure.

Lastly, we will have our annual church conference on November 25<sup>th</sup> at 7 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. This is the meeting where we share goals for the upcoming year, approve clergy salaries, hear from our new District Superintendent, Rev. Dr. Javier Olivares, among other items. Likewise, all are invited to attend and all church members are considered voting members. I hope to see you there!

# Celebrating Our First Preview and Lessons We're Learning

In September, we stepped out in faith together — and what a month it's been! When the Outreach & Worship Team first gathered in July, we sensed God calling us to imagine what worship might look like for those who long for something different: a place to reconnect with God, find belonging, and experience the sacred in a simpler, slower way.

In less than two months, this team dreamed, planned, and launched Catalina Unplugged. These three preview services were beautiful. We saw the chapel glow at sunset, shared the Lord's Table each week, welcomed 5 new faces, and 3 who returned to Catalina after time away. Across the three Sundays, we averaged about 30 people each week, plus six children on two of the evenings. We gathered around music, prayer, and Scripture — and each week we learned something that will help us shape the future of a second service.

This first preview would not have been possible without the Outreach & Worship Team's vision, wisdom, talent, and dedication. Meeting every week, they attended every detail: welcoming greeters, preparing bulletins and liturgy, rehearsing music, setting up audio-visual, arranging communion, and the dozens of small things that make worship feel warm and prayerful. Paige and Anthony also offered a low-key but engaging space for children, and we were delighted to have six kids join us on two of the three Sundays.

We also want to thank everyone who attended these preview services. You were our true partners in this first preview — helping us navigate what worked well and what could be improved. Your honest feedback about what you loved, what felt meaningful, and even what didn't quite connect has been invaluable. It guided us through these first steps and will continue to shape our discernment moving forward.

We received enthusiastic feedback for offering this style of worship again in the future — many suggested holding it at least twice a month, perhaps even weekly. Several proposed a Sunday 5:00 p.m. start time to better fit family schedules and the shorter daylight hours of fall and winter. We're so grateful for the support of the whole church as we explore new ways to reach our community!

Many of you have asked thoughtful questions about Unplugged and what's next. Here are a few I'd like to respond to:

Who is this second service for? Everyone is welcome. We especially hope to reach those who are spiritually curious but not currently connected to a church, as well as young adults — including Millennial parents — who are seeking a theologically progressive, inclusive community and a welcoming place to raise their children.

**Is this an LGBTQ+ service?** Not exclusively. Just like our 10 a.m. traditional service, Unplugged and future previews reflect Catalina's deep commitment to being intentionally inclusive and celebratory of all people — in worship, programs, and leadership.

How does a second service serve such a diverse community? One of the gifts of the church is that worship brings us together across generations, identities, families, and beliefs. While smaller groups like Bible studies or service projects can focus on particular interests or ages, worship gathers us as one diverse body in Christ.

Why haven't we advertised yet? We want first-time visitors to have the best experience possible. Previews like Catalina Unplugged allow us to experiment with music, sermon length, prayer styles, and other details — and to receive honest feedback from people who understood we were testing things out. Before we launch publicly, we want to refine what we've learned so that newcomers feel welcomed right from the start.

What's next? The Outreach & Worship Team will spend October discerning what's next. We may offer Unplugged again, explore a discussion-based gathering, or a family-focused evening. Our hope is to launch a regular second worship opportunity in February, around Lent, with a full communication campaign that includes social media, local advertising, and community outreach.

Friends, we celebrate what God has already done among us — and the ways the Spirit continues to lead us forward. Thank you for your prayers, your presence, and your openness to trying something new!

# Congregational Update on Adoption of the Simplified Accountable Structure for Church Governance

Last year Catalina UMC adopted the following goal for 2025:

Explore the adoption and implementation of the simplified accountable structure (SAS). We will work with a certified SAS consultant that will lead us through a 12-step process which begins with a Discernment Phase to explore the model with the congregation to determine if this is right for Catalina UMC.

The Discernment Team has finished their work and completed presentations to the congregation. We provided two sessions after Sunday church services and 2 via zoom, with one of them being a deep dive presentation from our District SAS coach Christopher Wurpts. About 40 church members engaged in these presentations. We received good and thoughtful discussion and feedback. It is the Discernment Team's opinion that once attendees understood the process and how it was intended to work, they were very supportive of Catalina adopting this model of church governance.

I am excited to inform you that the Catalina UMC Church Council has unanimously agreed that Catalina should move forward with a Charge Conference on Sunday Oct-12 at 11:30 am in the sanctuary to vote on adopting the SAS governance model.

If you still have questions or want to discuss further, the Catalina Discernment Team is available to have a discussion with you. Please reach out to whom you prefer.

## MISSIONS UPDATE BY DOUG WINGERT, CHAIR

At Catalina United Methodist Church, we work to assist the "poorest of the poor" in our community.

We have just a few activities to report this month, but it looks like we will be quite busy in the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter. As usual, the work is plentiful, but the workers are scarce. We are always looking for new volunteers.

**Primavera Men's Shelter** – We successfully held our August 23<sup>rd</sup> outreach at Primavera and look forward to our next dinner outreach on Saturday, September 27<sup>th</sup>. We have our cooking team ready to work, but we still need volunteers in October and November. Meals are planned in advance and grocery shopping is done by team leaders. New volunteers are always paired with experienced volunteers. If you can help on **Saturday, October 25<sup>th</sup> or November 22<sup>nd</sup> from 2:00 pm to 6:00 pm**, please notify Doug Wingert at <u>dougwingert@gmail.com</u> or contact the church office. (If a four-hour outreach is too much, how about a two-hour shift? We could divide the work from 2:00 pm – 4:00 pm and 4:00 pm – 6:00 pm). This outreach is scheduled for the 4<sup>th</sup> Saturdays of every month. We cook and serve a great meal to men living with homelessness. The work involves standing and lifting, cooking, and serving. All volunteers who are gloved, and over the age of 12 are welcome.

Casa Maria Soup Kitchen – Our small team of volunteers met very early on August 16<sup>th</sup> at Casa Maria, where we cooked and served more than 300 servings of soup to our neighbors living with homelessness and hunger. Our next opportunity to cook and serve will be on **Saturday, October 18th, at 6:30 am**. (Even 7:00 am would work)! Would you like to join a small team of volunteers who cook and serve our excellent chicken-vegetable soup to about 250 of our hungry neighbors? The work involves standing, lifting, cooking, and serving, using large commercial pots in a very small kitchen. Our volunteers must be gloved, and over the age of 12. Interested? Office Snack Packs – Catalina continues to offer snacks and bottled water to our homeless and hungry neighbors. Prior contributions toward this outreach have been exhausted, so we are now funding this important mission effort through your generous donations.

Peanut Butter & Jelly Sandwich Making Marathon – Due to some mitigating health concerns, our missions team was unable to schedule a sandwich making event in September. But keep your calendars open for a Friday afternoon in early December. We will need about 20 your teers to make more than 500 sandwiches for those in Tucson living with hunger. Stand-by for more

**Angel Tree** – More information will follow in the coming weeks regarding our annual Christmas efforts to collect toys and clothing as Christmas gifts for children whose parents or guardians are incarcerated in the Arizona Prison system.

Why Missions?


Each day The Upper Room magazine publishes meditations, submitted by Christians from all over the world. Often these meditations give the reader a warm heart or at least something to think about. But every once in a while, a meditation has even more impact.

Recently a Christian in southeast Asia wrote a compelling meditation. His story reminded me that our church, Catalina United Methodist Church, is blessed with a beautiful campus, visible to thousands of people who drive through the heart of Tucson each day. Catalina is situated near the University of Arizona and surrounded by a large park, a library, and many fine homes. And yet . . . . we still encounter God's children who are suffering from homelessness and hunger and health issues and loneliness. Do we really encounter them, or are they often overlooked because it's just too uncomfortable or inconvenient to see them?

This writer in *The Upper Room* magazine brings us a simple truth; "when we serve those in need, we serve Christ Himself." Simple, but profound! The writer reminds us that "Jesus urges us to look beyond ourselves and our worries. He invites us to see the people who most need hope and healing, both inside and outside our church. Jesus is waiting for us in the widow's tears, in the father's trembling hands, and in the child's hungry cry." And yes, in Tucson, Arizona, this also includes those whose vision and reason are clouded by addictions.

The writer states, "serving the poor and wounded in our community is our highest calling as Christians; it is how we express Christ's love. We may not impress the world with our money or status, but we can offer God's presence though our simple acts of service."

When this writer closes in prayer, he prays: "God, open our eyes to see You in the faces of those who are forgotten and hurting. Lead us to live out Christ's love through simple acts of compassion." 
## It's Not Too Early!

Catalina has participated in the Prison Fellowship Angel Tree project for over 20 years. Our congregation generously purchases Christmas gifts (2 per child) for children whose parent is in prison. We will again have 50 children, which means 100 gifts will be purchased in December.

You will be given all of the necessary contact information and your phone call will get us specific gift requests for each child. It's a fun step, and the caregivers are very appreciative.

The next step will be in **early Nov.** to meet at church to write out the Angel Tags for each child with the gift request on it. (Date to be determined.) We hang the angel tags on the Christmas tree in mid November and members of the congregation choose a tag and then shop! There are more steps to follow, so stay tuned.

# Catalina UMC Day School Report by Carolyn Lovell, Executive Director

The Day School currently has an enrollment of 81 children, though with two staff children counted, the true enrollment is 79. While our toddler classrooms remain full and even require an expansion into C12, enrollment continues to lag in the 3's and two of the Pre-K classrooms, creating financial strain. Due to these challenges, one Assistant Educator position was eliminated, and most full-time staff were reduced to part-time hours, which has been difficult for them. Despite these struggles, we continue to celebrate our dedicated team: Ms. Tammie (Pre-K) marked 6 years, Ms. Dejah (Older Ones) 2 years, and Ms. Susan (Cook) an incredible 19 years of service.

To boost visibility and enrollment, the Day School is actively seeking grant opportunities, publishing outreach articles such as one in the Sam Hughes Neighborhood Newsletter and maintaining weekly Facebook updates to highlight classroom activities. Parents have been encouraged to spread the word, and community engagement remains strong.

Highlights this fall include chapel lessons on Leadership and Friendship, a joyful visit from Mr. Nature Music Garden. Our Meet the Teacher Night on September 18th brought in 26 families, allowing parents to tour classrooms, connect with teachers, and explore volunteer opportunities—special thanks to Pastor Mike for attending and representing the church.

We are excited to share that Catalina United Methodist Day School is now part of Fry's Food Stores Community Rewards Program! 
