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Catalina Collective: Creating New Pathways for Worship and Connection

Over the past several months, the Outreach and Worship Team has been engaged in an intentional season of listening, learning, and experimenting. From September through December, we piloted several different worship styles—at different times, in different locations—to explore what additional opportunities for gathering might feel authentic and life-giving for Catalina United Methodist Church.

At present, most of our communal worship life centers on our traditional service Sunday morning. And while that service continues to be vibrant and meaningful, we also recognize that many people—especially those we are seeking to reach—may be looking for something less formal and traditional. Just as importantly, we know that faithful innovation requires testing, patience, and discernment. Rather than rushing to launch something new, we began in-house, piloting ideas with our own community first to see what resonated and what felt organically “Catalina.”

Those fall pilots were intentionally not heavily advertised beyond our congregation. That allowed us to build comfort, learn from one another, and identify what styles of worship might naturally grow from who we already are. Now, after that initial season of learning, we are ready to take the next step: establishing a regular rhythm and beginning to share these offerings more openly around Tucson.

Introducing Catalina Collective

In this spirit, we are naming this season Catalina Collective — a ministry of Catalina UMC. Under this umbrella, we will be offering three distinct worship experiences through the spring, with a commitment to evaluate, adapt, and pivot as we learn.

Open Table

Our biggest surprise pilot of the fall was Open Table, a dinner-church experience centered on shared meals, simple liturgy, and guided conversation.

- Begins: Ash Wednesday, February 18 @ 5:30pm, Fellowship Hall
- Schedule: 3rd Wednesdays of the month (Feb 18, March 18, April 15, May 20)

Open Table is designed for those seeking a midweek, non-traditional worship experience rooted in hospitality and connection. Building relationships around a shared meal proved deeply meaningful during the pilot season—especially for families and children, who thrived in this relaxed, intergenerational setting.

Catalina Unplugged

Responding to a growing desire for reflective, contemplative worship, Catalina Unplugged offers a candlelit, acoustic, and meditative experience.

- Begins: Sunday, February 22 @ 5:00pm, Chapel
- Schedule: 2nd and 4th Sundays (Feb 22; March: 8, 22; April: 12, 26; May:10, 24)

This Sunday evening option is especially designed for those looking for a spiritual “reset” before the week ahead—a rhythm we learned is common among young adults and spiritually curious seekers.

Chapel Connections

Because many people still expect a Sunday morning entry point into church life, we will also offer Chapel Connections, a blended, more casual worship service that bridges traditional and contemporary styles.

- Begins: Sunday, March 1 @ 10:00am, Chapel
- Schedule: 1st and 3rd Sundays (March: 1,15 April: 19 May: 3,17)

A few dates to note:

- March 29 (Fifth Sunday / Palm Sunday): One joint traditional worship service
- April 5 (Easter Sunday): One traditional service at 10:00 a.m. in the main sanctuary

I also plan to be present at the traditional service on second and fourth Sundays. I miss many of you when I’m not there, and I look forward to worshiping together while also helping our congregation navigate this new rhythm.

What to Expect This Spring

Our commitment is to offer these worship options consistently through May, giving our community time to settle into the rhythm. We know this season may feel a bit complex at first—but with regularity comes familiarity.

Why Multiple Worship Options?

A natural question is: Why offer multiple worship services? The answer is simple and grounded in our mission. Just as we tested different styles internally, we now need to test them more publicly to see what connects with people beyond our walls—especially those seeking a faith community for the first time or returning after time away.

At a training workshop last October, our Outreach and Worship Team gathered with other forward-thinking, growing Methodist ministries. One key insight stood out: healthy, outward-focused churches create multiple access points for people to connect. Most younger adults and families are not looking for another Sunday morning obligation; many are drawn instead to midweek gatherings, Sunday evening “resets,” or worship that feels relational, relational, and embodied in community.

How You Can Help

- Pray — for this next season of experimentation, for the people we haven’t met yet, and for the new things God is already stirring.
- Spread the word — invitations matter more than advertisements.
- Volunteer — Open Table needs 8 table hosts per month. Hosts welcome guests, facilitate pre-planned discussion questions, and help create a spirit of hospitality. Training and support will be provided. We could also use help with meal planning and meal prep. If you’re interested, please email me kelli@catalinamethodist.org

MISSIONS UPDATE

At Catalina United Methodist Church, we work to assist the “poorest of the poor” in our community.

Lotsa Pasta Food Drive – It's back!! The annual Interfaith Community Services, (ICS) pasta food drive will run throughout the month of February. Catalina will, once again, participate by putting collection bins in the Sanctuary narthex and in the church office to collect your pasta, macaroni and cheese, and pasta sauces, (in plastic jars or cans only. No glass please). Last February we collected 185 food items. Can we beat that number?

Primavera Men's Shelter – On January 24th, our Primavera cooking team served our five-course dinner to approximately 60 men living at the Primavera shelter. We were blessed with two new volunteers, who provided excellent kitchen skills to make this dinner come together smoothly and on time. We will be cooking and serving again on **Saturday, February 28th**. Who can help us out? We need four volunteers for the February 28th date. If you can help on that date, from 2:00 pm to 6:00 pm, please notify Doug Wingert at dougwingert@gmail.com or contact the church office. (*If a four-hour outreach is too much, how about a two-hour shift? We could divide the work from 2:00 pm – 4:00 pm and 4:00 pm – 6:00 pm*). The meals are planned in advance and the grocery shopping is done by team leaders. The work involves standing and lifting, cooking, and serving. All volunteers who are gloved, and over the age of 12 are welcome. If the February 28th date does not work for you, we will be cooking and serving at the Primavera Men's Shelter on the fourth Saturday of every month in 2026. Mark your calendars. We need volunteers.

Casa Maria Soup Kitchen – Catalina volunteers typically serve approximately 350 cups of chicken vegetable soup, made from scratch, at the Casa Maria Soup Kitchen. This provides a hot meal for so many people living with homelessness and hunger. We have been assigned some early dates this year, both Saturday, January 31st and February 7th. We have cooking teams for those dates, but next up will be **March 7th**. Cooking teams get to work early on Saturday mornings, (6:30 am – 7:00 am), and the work involves standing and cooking in a very small kitchen for about 3 to 4 hours. We need three volunteers for March 7th. Please contact Doug Wingert at dougwingert@gmail.com if you are interested in helping on **March 7th** or future Saturday dates.

Office Snack Packs – Catalina continues to offer snacks and bottled water to our homeless and hungry neighbors. Prior contributions toward this outreach have been exhausted, so we are now funding this important mission effort through your generous donations. If you wish to contribute to our snack pack budget, please designate “snack packs” on your donation.

Other News – Would you like to help plan our mission outreach events by participating in Catalina's mission outreach efforts? The need is great, but the workers are few. February Observances

In 2007 the United Nations established February 20th as the **World Day of Social Justice**, recognizing the need to promote social justice, which includes efforts to tackle issues such as poverty, exclusion, gender inequality, unemployment, human rights, and social protections. While primarily focused on governmental and agency roles and activities, it should also remind us of the needs our own communities should be trying to address more locally. This year's theme, framed by the UN to address systemic inequality and advance social justice, is "Empowering Inclusion: Bridging Gaps for Social Justice" and focuses on inclusive policies and social protections.

Black History Month starts on February 1st, with the theme, "A Century of Black History Commemorations." The following summary is taken from the website of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (ASNLH).

2026 marks a century of national commemorations of Black history. Dr. Carter Godwin Woodson, George Cleveland Hall, William B. Hartgrove, Jesse E. Moorland, Alexander L. Jackson, and James E. Stamps institutionalized the teaching, study, dissemination, and commemoration of Black history when they founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (ASNLH) on September 9, 1915.

In 1925, when Dr. Carter G. Woodson planned the inaugural week-long observance of Black history, he could hardly have anticipated the imprint he would leave on the world. From Negro History Week to Black History Month, ASALH has carried forth the tradition, and the observances have become part of the warp and weft of American culture and increasingly the global community. For our 100th theme, the founders of Black History Month urge us to explore the impact and meaning of Black history and life commemorations in transforming the status of Black peoples in the modern world.

2025 CUMC Foundation Update

We are so fortunate to have our Foundation. Thanks to all who contribute currently and thank you to all since 1958 for the generosity and fiduciary care over the decades. Although our current balance in the Foundation is a generous one, we are currently spending more than we are earning. The grand total of Foundation monies spent in 2025 was \$513,293.09. The main categories were operating budget, program and property, Trustees, and the 5 restroom remodels. We also awarded several scholarships to university students connected to church and ministerial scholarships for pastors in our conference. Some of the Trustees's expenses were to replace the original mission tile roofs on the Day School and the Fellowship Hall. Another expense is the constant maintenance of an older campus.

The Foundation Board will be working closely with the church finance team to try to mitigate the spending from the Foundation, as this amount annually is not sustainable. Please pray for decisions to be made to maintain buildings and grounds, and keep programs vibrant and growing.

Juan Cristobal Flores was a scholarship singer with our Sanctuary Choir for 10 years. He was the victim of a shooting and sadly passed away from his injuries. The choir would like to possibly commission a choir anthem in his memory, and/or start a scholarship fund in his memory. Choir members will be researching the potential commissioning of an anthem and no decision has been made yet to do this idea. Having a memorial scholarship fund at church would also be a great way to remember Juan. If either of these ideas appeal to you, you are invited to donate to the Sanctuary Choir Fund/Juan Cristobal Flores. We will keep you informed as to which direction we will take. It depends on how much money is raised.

- We have recently acquired a section of an unused school, which will become our future home.
- Construction is set to begin in the spring to create a commercial kitchen that will enhance our program and allow us to serve many more families.

Fresh Initiatives

- We are collaborating with several local farms to incorporate fresh ingredients and introduce the children to new and exciting foods.

With the ongoing support from the Tucson community, the steadfast generosity of CUMC, and the potential for future corporate sponsorships, we are determined to combat childhood insecurity in Tucson and beyond.


